Our Wonderful Visit to Milly 30th May – 1st June 2025

After a l-o-n-g hiatus of six years, nineteen FRTA members travelling independently were able to be housed, entertained, fed, watered and wined by the wonderful hosts of the Milly Jumelage.

We (Natasha, my brother, John, and I) joined the weekend slightly later as we arrived from Gonneville-sur-Scie in Normandy (where thirteen of us had enjoyed a fantastic family week there) on the Saturday. The journey went relatively smoothly. Although at first I was slightly disconcerted by the lack of physical toll barriers, it soon became clear that the Sanef company (which manages the péage on the A13 and A6) was trialling a 'free-flow' procedure. It isn't 'free', of course, but if you're

travelling from Dieppe to Milly, using the motorways, it works out at about £7 or £8 each way. Using camera recognition technology, it does all the calculation for you and you have 72 hours to pay online.

Another aspect of driving in France which was also a bit of a surprise was the Crit'Air sticker you are expected to display if you're driving through the bigger cities such as Paris or Rouen. It's a bit like ULEZ, except you have to display the sticker on the windscreen. It's essential to sign up online in the UK and print out your sticker as

they come in different colours according to the type and emissions of your vehicle.

Of course, everyone who drove there will know this already. This is just for the ones who are planning a future journey to France.

Thanks to Don and Saskia, we found Claude and Dominique's address. Even though it is centrally-located in Milly, there

are many separate buildings surrounding a courtyard with a beautiful garden. Claude explained that it was once a farm and one of the most striking buildings is the huge, converted barn, the venue for a sumptuous communal meal in 2017, that I remember with such fondness.

But I can't say anything different for the equally sumptuous Saturday lunchtime meal this year, prepared by Dominique for Natasha, John and I. The highlights for me were a delicious Provençal dish of stuffed tomatoes which was followed by a delicately flavoured dessert of passion fruit and strawberries. It was lovely to nourish and strengthen our friendship with Claude and Dominique after a long gap and it was great to meet Quentin, their grandson, who very graciously came to my assistance as I struggled (continuously!) with communication.

After a short rest it was time for another glorious meal – the group dinner on the Saturday evening at La Piazzetta. The atmosphere was abuzz with jollity and merriment when we arrived (slightly late!) in the large glass-walled annexe of the

restaurant, so it was difficult for our little party to meet and greet everybody. Next time, we hope! The whole evening was a happy commingling of French savoir-faire and chic, British repartee and mistranslating and Italian flavours and cuisine. I was given a refreshing mildly-bitter but fruity beer, which might have been the blonde Affligem, but, sadly, I didn't ask. There were lots of takers on our table for that staple of

French culture, Ricard – the anise and liquorice-flavoured pastis. I was assured by many connoisseurs nearby that it was important to get the ratio of one part pastis to five of water. I tried a sip and must say it brought back the heady days of trips to France decades ago – although I think it's also linked in my memory with the strong tarry aroma of Gauloises. I was also given a sip of Kir. In my ignorance, I had thought that this must be some sort of Russian liqueur. I was really pleasantly surprised to find it is a very palatable combination of white wine and Crème de cassis, a blackcurrant liqueur. The taste is a pleasant blend of sweetness and acidity. I have it on my Christmas wish list.

All of the main courses looked mouth-watering and I have to say that the Vegetable Cannelloni was beautifully cooked and the best I've ever tasted. For dessert I had a rich creamy tiramisu that melted in the mouth. After post-prandial drinks, the memorably delicious evening came to an end. Like an Italian opera, it was rich and sensory with a great many flavours and textures and PSG won 5 – 1!.

Our home journey via Dieppe went quite smoothly. We were able to park relatively easily in Dieppe, as the Grand Rassemblement de Dieppe or Alpine sportscar rally, held from 30 May to 1 June was just winding down. As far as I know it's an annual event, but this year was the 70th anniversary of the brand's founding by Jean Rédélé in Dieppe in 1955 so there were a huge number of visitors in the port city. However, the area around the Church of Saint-Jacques was quietly inviting so we ventured inside this uniquely charming building, which, we discovered, is on the

pilgrim route to St James of Compostela and has a history going back to the 11th century. Various prayer chapels for different Saints lined each side of the cathedrallike nave. Both the outside and inside are, sadly, are in serious need of restoration.

It was then a quick scamper to the car followed by a long circuitous drive to the port. The four-hour crossing gives you a chance to wind down after the waiting and delays and then, before we knew it, we were back in leafy Forest Row.

Tim Leeney 1941 – 2024 – A Full and Well-Lived Life

It was a huge shock for everyone at the end of December when we heard that Tim had died suddenly. Although he had been under the weather for several weeks before Christmas, nobody was expecting the sad news. Tim had been a member of FRTA for many vears and had also taken over as Chair from December 2014 to

October 2016. Tim had an impressive command of many languages, which included Russian, Italian, Japanese and, of course, French. I remember his fluent inaugural Chairman's speech in Milly in 2017. I was grateful to Tim coaching me (on the coach!) so that I – as a novice committee member - could address the gathering in the reception area in French. We had two lovely twinning meals with Tim and Olga last October during the visit of our French friends – both of them with Jeremy and Gwenda and Jean-Pierre Trotin and his family. I know that Tim was greatly appreciated and highly thought of by all the members of the French Jumelage as well, of course, as everyone in our own association.

I was just getting to know Tim and his family when he announced that they were off to spend the next few years in the South of France. They were all very excited to be setting off on this adventure.

A few years before, while visiting their old London friends, Caroline and her daughter Iris, in the south of France, they had been introduced to Iris's school, the Centre Internationale de Valbonne (CIV), part of a large French Lycee near Antibes. Then, in the early 2000's, when they visited the CIV, to explore the possibility of Varya studying there for the IB, they were very impressed with the spacious campus, and excellent facilities. And of course



the location was persuasive - yachts on the sea, and snowy peaks inland. During

their stay there, they lived in a beautiful, south-facing flat just below Le Bar sur Loup, an ancient hill village.

Both Tim and Olga wrote fondly about their time in the south of France in a previous Twinning newsletter. In the article Tim reminisced about golden days in 2004, bathing in the sea by the fortress of Antibes and seeing the early snow already on the Alpes Maritimes, while Olga remembered the amazing bread, 'amazing because it was real'. She was also struck by the steep streets of Le Bar sur Loup, the 'stairs, stairs, stairs' and a castle on top of the hill, which was refurbished into a 10-star hotel, where they stayed one night on Olga's birthday.

In a ten page booklet containing tributes to Tim which accompanied the order of service at his funeral, the phrase, 'We will miss him so much' was repeated many times'. I am sure that this will be felt by all who knew him.

Brian Infield 28th October 1925 – February 2025

It was wonderful to see Brian when he came with his family to the Community Centre to greet the arrival of our French friends on Friday 25th of October last year, just three days before his 99th birthday. He had walked into the Garden Room without a stick or anyone's assistance and was still as hale and hearty as he always was. It was therefore a great shock to hear of his death in February, just eight months before becoming a centenarian. His determination to look after his wife, Denise, during her illness for as long as she lived was just one example of his steeliness and strength of character.

Brian was chair of FRTA for a number of

years – before I joined - so I do not remember those earlier times of the Twinning. I do remember sitting beside Brian for the Annual Dinner at the Golf Club a number of years ago where he gave me a brief resume of his fascinating personal and family history. He explained that his grandfather, Max, after having been unlawfully harassed in Cracow by the Schlachta [an aristocratic, antisemitic Polish political party], had decided to emigrate to England in 1900.

His retirement was a happy and fulfilling time as he had many interests – Amnesty International, chairing the Board at Tablehurst Farm and, of course – our Twinning Association. He and Denise were very keen cyclists, often going off each year on cycling holidays to France. I would often see Brian cycling around the village when he must have been around 90 years of age! He seemed to be a fixture. Sadly that can't be. We will all miss him very much.
